Course Overview

Psychology is the scientific study of mind and behaviour. It is about understanding people. It is about understanding yourself. Psychology as a subject is like a jigsaw, and each piece of the jigsaw represents a different type of psychology.

Psychologists have questions:

'Why did people obey Adolf Hitler?', "How is the human mind constructed?", "What is the importance of early life to our personality as young people?"

Relationships which considers the factors that cause and maintain attraction and the theories of how relationships are formed and end

Forensic psychology where both biological and psychological explanations of offender behaviour are explored and how we deal with offending behaviour to try and reduce reoffending

Schizophrenia will look at the clinical characteristics and the various causes of the disorder

Having asked these questions, psychologists seek answers."

A Level Psychology will require grade 5 in a GCSE Science related subject or 55 or above in combined science

Assessment

A level Psychology is 100% exam based. You will complete three x 2-hour exam papers at the end of the course.
